 ${f S}$ ammy had not spoken in a long time. This is a Christmas story, so you know it will have a happy ending, a small miracle even. It also has a dog, a black Lab named Dollar. Many of the best Christmas stories have dogs. Sammy sat in a wheelchair in a hospital. He was a small man, thin and frail, and he wore an old coat that was frayed and threadbare. He shivered as if he were cold — though, as it happens, this story is from autumn, before the winter chill. Sammy stared at the floor, and he looked sad, although no one was quite sure what Sammy was feeling. He would not talk. This is how it can be, at the end. Judy Grant and Dollar walked in. There is a group in town called Pets for Life, and what these folks do — what they have done in Kansas City for 20 years now — is take their dogs (and, occasionally, other pets like cats and birds) and visit people. They visit hospitals and retirement homes and shelters for victims of violence. They visit children who cannot read and families preparing for death and correction centers. Volunteers visit almost every day, and they bring along all sorts of dogs, poodles and Pomeranians and pugs and pekepoos and pointers, pretty much every pedigree of pup you could possibly picture. Judy touched Sammy's shoulder and said, "Dollar came to visit you." His eyes looked far off; the nurses said he had been unresponsive for a long time. Judy did not know anything about Sammy, where he had come from, what he had done in his life, why he was in the hospital. Volunteers don't know. She guessed he was in his 70s. "We got Dollar out of the pound," she told Sammy. He stared off to the wall. In her time as a volunteer, Judy had been amazed at how people responded to Dollar. This is the point of Pets for Life, of course. She had been told about studies that show how much good a dog can do for the elderly and sick and discouraged. There is a heart doctor in town that actually writes "Walk your dog" as a prescription. Still, she was not ready for the way people opened up around Dollar. They all do in some way. With some, it is a hint of a smile or a glint in the eye. Once, she was walking Dollar around a psych unit when suddenly an older man blurted out, "A dog is a man's best friend." She turned around and took Dollar over. He petted the dog and then began to cry. He remembered his own dog from when he was young. 'I'm sorry," Judy said. "We don't want to make you sad."

"No," the man said. "It's not sad. I just remember."

All Pets for Life volunteers have stories like this — stories about Alzheimer's patients who always remember the name of the dog, children who learn their letters by reading to puppies and so on. One tells of a stroke victim who first used her arm to pet her dog. There's one of an elderly woman who talked in gibberish for three years every time the volunteer came by. Never understood a word. Then one day, the woman looked up and said, "Thank you for visiting." Then she looked at the dog and said, "You're my sweetheart."Judy was not getting through to Sammy, though. So she had Dollar do a few tricks — shake hands, lie down, all the classics. Suddenly, he was enthralled. He watched closely. Judy asked Sammy if he wanted a treat for Dollar. He nodded.

The nurses were almost in tears.

Judy gave him a little treat. He gave it to Dollar.

He wanted another. These were small treats, the size of peas, and Dollar is a big dog, 80 pounds or so. She gave him the treat. He gave it to Dollar.

He put out his hand for another. Judy gave it to him.

And then, the miracle happened. Judy will never forget it. Sammy spoke.

"How come you're so (expletive) stingy with your treats?" he asked.
